Coutts Museum hosts open studio night

The Coutts Museum of Art hosting an open studio night once a week

Those wanting to get creative but lacking the space at home have a new option with a program started by the Coutts Museum of Art in El Dorado.

The museum has begun holding an open studio night at the museum from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. every Tuesday, located in the classroom across the alley.

"The goal is just to provide a place people in the community can come and do a project," said Rod Seel, Coutts Museum director. "They can make a mess and we have supplies and materials they may not have."

During this time, people can work on a project they already have going or get involved with something else.

Seel said there was no pressure, no structure and no skills needed to attend.

They also will have museum staff and area artists there to offer help with projects and periodically will hold a more organized class people can attend.

"These are wonderful people here with all kids of skills." Another person taking advantage of the space was Jack Sanders.

He was working on a colored pencil drawing of a bird.

"I told my grandchildren if they named a favorite bird, I would draw it for them," he explained.
